NOTTINGHAM ACADEMY CAMPUSES

Nottingham Academy is a very large organisation and is one of a small number of all-through 3-19 schools in the country with its own Nursery, Primary, Secondary and Sixth Form provision.

Greenwood Campus includes our Primary Campus and serves the Sneinton and Bakersfield areas.

Greenwood Campus

Greenwood Campus Site 1 on Greenwood Road is our main site which provides education for Years 8-11. This site also caters for our separate Primary provision.

Greenwood Campus Site 2, also known as 'The Bridge' is based on Sneinton Boulevard. The Bridge Campus is the venue for our Sixth Form and Year 7 students. This campus is smaller than our main site, but accommodates an excellent suite of facilities for our students to flourish.

OUR CURRICULUM AT NOTTINGHAM ACADEMY

At Nottingham Academy, our curriculum offers a broad and balanced range of subjects, designed to develop academic excellence and provide students with the skills and knowledge necessary for future success. Our subjects are underpinned by a commitment to personal development, critical thinking, and fostering a passion for learning.

Art & Design Learning Journey

Our Art & Design curriculum encourages creativity and self-expression, while developing essential technical skills. From foundational knowledge to advanced techniques, students are guided to discover their unique artistic voice.

Key Highlights:

- Key Stage 3 (Years 7-9): Students explore media such as graffiti, portraits, and sculpture, learning key art principles.
- Key Stage 4 (Years 10-11): Personalized projects and client briefs help students refine their technical skills and creativity

Computing Learning Journey

Our Computing curriculum equips students with critical digital skills, from foundational computing knowledge to advanced multimedia production and programming.

Key Highlights:

- Key Stage 3 (Years 7-9): Students are introduced to online safety, coding, and multimedia projects, building foundational IT skills.
- Key Stage 4 (Years 10-11): Students specialize in creative media and IT systems, with a focus on practical applications and exam preparation

Drama Learning Journey

Drama at Nottingham Academy fosters confidence, creativity, and communication. Students engage in a variety of performances, from classical works to devised pieces, and explore the technical and theoretical aspects of theatre.

Key Highlights:

- Key Stage 3 (Years 7-9): Students develop their performance skills, exploring Shakespeare, Epic Theatre, and Verbatim Theatre.
- Key Stage 4 (Years 10-11): Students refine their skills through the BTEC Tech Award, focusing on professional performances and original drama

Geography Learning Journey

Our Geography curriculum immerses students in the study of physical and human landscapes, preparing them to address global challenges such as climate change and resource management.

Key Highlights:

 Key Stage 3 (Years 7-9): Students explore topics such as ecosystems, urbanization, and extreme weather. Key Stage 4 (Years 10-11): Focus areas include globalization, conflicts, and sustainable development, preparing students for their GCSEs

History Learning Journey

The History curriculum at Nottingham Academy provides students with a deep understanding of key events and figures that have shaped the modern world, fostering analytical and critical thinking skills.

Key Highlights:

- Key Stage 3 (Years 7-9): Students explore medieval Britain, the Industrial Revolution, and major global conflicts.

- Key Stage 4 (Years 10-11): Advanced topics include anatomy, physiology, and sports psychology, preparing students for GCSE PE or BTEC Sport qualifications

Religious Education (RE) Learning Journey

Our RE curriculum encourages students to explore philosophical, ethical, and religious questions, helping them develop a deeper understanding of diverse beliefs and cultural practices.

Key Highlights:

 Key Stage 3 (Years 7-9): Students explore topics such as creation narratives, moral

- dilemmas, and religious perspectives on conflict and justice.
- Key Stage 4 (Years 10-11): Students delve into philosophy, ethics, and studies of major world religions

Spanish Learning Journey

Spanish at Nottingham Academy opens doors to language mastery, from basic conversational skills to advanced grammar and cultural studies.

Key Highlights:

- Key Stage 3 (Years 7-9): Students begin with foundational grammar and vocabulary, moving on to more complex tenses and cultural topics.
- Key Stage 4 (Years 10-11): Focus on mastering the language for GCSE exams through speaking, writing, and listening

Technology Learning Journey

Our Technology curriculum nurtures innovation and problem-solving through hands-on projects in design, engineering, and food technology.

Key Highlights:

- Key Stage 3 (Years 7-9): Students explore design principles, cooking skills, and practical engineering tasks.
- Key Stage 4 (Years 10-11): Focus on systems control, reverse engineering, and nutrition

Additional Subjects in Key Stage 4 (Years 10 and 11)

In addition to the core and creative subjects, Nottingham Academy offers several specialized courses for Year 10 and 11 students, including:

- Child Care: Providing a foundation in understanding the needs and development of young children.
- Enterprise & Marketing: Focusing on business acumen and entrepreneurial skills, preparing students for future opportunities in business.
- Health and Social Care: Developing knowledge and skills to understand and support health and social care environments
- Urdu: Offering students the opportunity to learn Urdu language and culture, enhancing their linguistic and cultural awareness.

NOTTINGHAM ACADEMY SIXTH FORM CENTRE



We recognise that older students have different needs and we have an established and enhanced Post-16 provision at our Greenwood Campus. Our Sixth Form Centre offers students aged 16-19 a range of academic and vocational courses with excellent tutorial support and careers guidance available. Students leave Nottingham Academy Sixth Form fully prepared for university, training or future

ADMISSIONS

Pupils are admitted at the start of, and during, our four main stages:

- Nursery (ages 3 5)
- Primary reception (age 5)
- Secondary year 7 (age 11)
- Secondary post-16 (age 16)

Pupils on roll in the primary part of the Academy have an automatic place in the secondary part of the Academy.

Admission Numbers:

- a) 180 part time or 150 full time places nursery
- b) 150 full time places reception
- c) 300 full time places year 7 (including 100 pupils automatically transferring from the Academy's primary provision)
- d) 300 full time places post 16 (including all year 11 pupils at the Academy who choose to stay on and meet the entry requirements for Nottingham Academy Sixth Form Centre)

TO APPLY FOR A PLACE AT NOTTINGHAM ACADEMY

For admission to our nursery provision parents should contact the Primary Reception on our Greenwood Campus site on 0115 748 3385 to apply for a place.

For admission to primary reception and to secondary year 7, in the year preceding admission, parents should apply using Nottingham City Council's Co-ordinated Admissions Scheme.
